# Part A: Service Premium Strategy Plan

## Statement of Intent

At Pirbright we are incredibly proud of our links with the military and have children from a range of different service backgrounds across the local area. We work hard to ensure transition, both in and out of school, is as efficient as possible for parents whilst welcoming the children into our community with open arms. Our objective is always to ensure that children feel settled, safe and happy as soon as possible so they can begin their learning journey with us and be fully integrated in our school community and all it has to offer.

The purpose of the school's Service Pupil Premium (SSP) is to support children who come from military families during challenging times and, as a school, we receive a sum of money for each of our children who have serving parents. The aim is to reduce the potential impact of being in a service family during challenging times, be that with mobility or deployment. The school must provide planned provision over time, in which case the school have full responsibility for how we spend our SPP. It is not a fund which can be directly accessed by parents of eligible children.

### **Pupil Premium Funding Context for Pirbright Village Primary School**

Pirbright is a two-form entry primary school in Surrey with a lower than average number of disadvantaged pupils. 9% of the children on role (38/410) are disadvantaged. We are located near to Alexander Barracks and the higher than average proportion of military children (25-30% receiving the Service Pupil Premium award) we have means dealing with issues surrounding mobility and transition on a regular basis with. 27% (96/350) of the children in Year 1-6 are identified as a late starter to the full Pirbright experience (children who do not start within the first term of their Reception year). Attendance is excellent for both Service Premium children (94.9%) and Non-Service Premium children (95.9%).

## Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

<b>Challenge number</b>	<b>Detail of challenge</b>
1	Some children receiving the Service Premium grant have emotional, health and wellbeing issues which affect their resilience in school and their strategies to learn.
2	Parental engagement within the Service Premium community can be lower than that of their peers.
3	Service Premium children need additional support with transition both into and out of Pirbright Village Primary School.

## Intended outcomes

Children will transition into school life quickly so they don't miss any learning times.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>All SP children will feel confident and happy at Pirbright within their first six weeks (measured by teachers reviewing with children) or they will have additional support in place to improve this.</li> </ul>

## Activity in this academic year

### Teaching (for example, CPD, recruitment and retention)

Budgeted cost: £2200

Activity	Evidence that supports this approach
Service Premium Champion	The Service Premium (SP) funding requires a SP Champion to oversee the provision in school and liaise with various stakeholders to ensure the targets are being met. Liaising with the school military governor, attending military events and working closely with families will allow the school to further understand the challenges and needs of the community.

### Targeted academic support (for example, tutoring, one-to-one support structured interventions)

Budgeted cost: £7500

Activity	Evidence that supports this approach
Quality, targeted intervention for children who need to have gaps plugged from being at a different school to Pirbright.	Intensive tuition in small groups is often provided to support lower attaining learners or those who are falling behind, Overall, the pattern is that small group tuition is effective and the smaller the group the better. Greater feedback from the leader, more sustained engagement in smaller groups, or work which is more closely matched to learners' needs explains this impact.

Nurture Farm Visits	<p>On average, EHW interventions have an identifiable and significant impact on attitudes to learning, social relationships in school, and attainment itself (adding on 4 months+). EHW programs appear to benefit disadvantaged or low-attaining pupils more than other pupils. Providing children with access to trained adults will ensure the prioritising of mental health which will lead to improved attainment.</p> <p>Parental involvement is consistently associated with pupils' success at school and this may have a cumulative effect when there are siblings in a family. Maintenance of the PEDALS building as the home of Pirbright EHWP site.	On average, EHW interventions have an identifiable and significant impact on attitudes to learning, social relationships in school, and attainment itself (adding on 4 months+). EHW programs appear to benefit disadvantaged or low-attaining pupils more than other pupils. Providing children with access to trained adults will ensure the prioritising of mental health which will lead to improved attainment.
Parent Cafes, workshops and drop-in sessions for support with children. Additional opportunities to attend parents' evenings.	Parental involvement is consistently associated with pupils' success at school and this may have a cumulative effect when there are siblings in a family. Family engagement has been shown to improve children's outcomes across the board at Pirbright and something to be encouraged.
Extra-curricular support.	Taking part in sports has been shown to improve mental health, concentration and reduce stress. Children accessing the Service Premium funding are at greater risk of all of these elements and should get a club priority when we allocate places. Pirbright clubs cost £10 per term and this fee will be waived for parents of SP children for one club per term.
Use of the Military Community Hub (Padlet) to spotlight any key events or school	<p>School engagement is key to the success of our pupils and whilst information is published in weekly newsletters from the school, using a second avenue via the military's online noticeboard will reinforce messages and ensure all stakeholders are away of key information. This means other non-school based members of the community can reference and encourage greater parental engagement.</p> <p>Liaison and integration with our local community is important to serve all of our children and opportunities (ie jobs or events) which may benefit non-</p>

information for parents.	parental members of the military should be shared so they also have the opportunity to become part of the school. This could also help military parents to feel proud of Pirbright Village Primary School and encourage dialogue between non-members of the school and the current school population.
Linked Governor	Strategic overview of the school's policy and procedures and a greater understanding of the military set up and challenges will strengthen bonds between the two 'camps'. Having a serving member of the Pirbright Military Community on the school's governing body who meets regularly with the school's Service Premium Champion will provide opportunity for discussion and ensure we are working together to benefit all.
Military aimed PVPS key information available for new recruits and incoming members of the army.	Information is key and incoming member of the military should be provided with robust and up to date information regarding PVPS as a school option on arrival. Utilising the military's online community hub to spotlight key information regarding provision for SP children will ensure parents make an informed decision about the school they choose for their children, particularly regarding pastoral and transitional care. Service Premium Champion to prepare documents for upload.

What was the impact of that spending on service pupil premium eligible pupils?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• PEDALS ran throughout the whole school year and provided support for the children who needed it</li> <li>• Of all children PEDALS saw, 32% of them were SP children. SP children make up 20% of the school population so they were prioritised for PEDALS support.</li> </ul>
